New Yiddish Music

ReynHartsik, which is the Yiddish musical duo of Yoshie Fruchter and Rabbi Deborah Sacks-Mintz, will present a concert at BEKI on Saturday, Jan. 10 at 7:30 pm.

ReynHartsik, meaning "heartfelt," explores Yiddish poetry, *loshen koydesh* (Hebrew- and Aramaic-derived


words in Yiddish), prayer, and niggun in an intimate acoustic folk setting. Using a combination of their voices with cello, guitar, bass, and mandolin, Fruchter and Sacks-Mintz bring new melodies to the Jewish music canon, using intricate songs, sensitive musicianship, and a sincere desire to connect with audiences.

The vocal chemistry between the duo is paramount, and the unique arrangements and compositions provide a setting that evokes past and present in perfect harmony. Sacks-Mintz, the Director of Tefillah and Music at Hadar Institute, is also a performer and composer who has collaborated on over two dozen albums and produced three

> of her own albums. She received rabbinic ordination from the Jewish Theological Seminary.

> Fruchter, who is a musician, composer and bandleader with nine albums, has performed with a wide variety of Jewish artists and at Broadway shows. He plays guitar, bass, oud, and mandolin.



Operation Isaiah Update

Thanks to everyone who donated to BEKI's annual Operation Isaiah high holy day food drive.

Lynn Brotman reports that she and Robert Lettick delivered 445 pounds of non-perishable food items, which is equivalent to 371 meals, plus \$250 in grocery gift cards to the Jewish Family Service (JFS) Food Pantry.

Their pantry is open to *all* members of the community—Jewish and non-Jewish alike—who are experiencing food insecurity, that is, they are without regular access to a sufficient amount of nutritious food and often do not know where they'll get their next meal.

Bikes for JCARR Families

JCARR, the Jewish Community Alliance for Refugee Resettlement, a partnership of six area synagogues and the Jewish Federation, has helped resettle ten families in the New Haven area. We're grateful for local organizations that have assisted us, for example the Bradley Street Bicycle Coop (BSBC), which this year provided bicycles to both young men in Family 10. Three years ago, BSBC donated bikes for the three little girls in Family 5, and this fall provided the larger bikes they needed.

LATKE VS. HAMENTASCH

ave you heard of a Latke-Hamentasch debate?

Many college Hillels, to celebrate Purim, host a debate about which food is better: the latke or the

hamentasch.

Years ago, when I lived in Ohio, I was asked to participate in OSU Hillel's debate. I was on the latke side, and I made an argument for the superiority of latkes that I think is airtight: A latke is not at essence a potato food – it is, at essence, about the oil. Any fried food can be considered a latke appropriate for Hanukkah. Also, deep-frying a food always improves it beyond its origi-

nal state. A deep fried hamentasch would necessarily be better than a regular hamentasch – and a deep fried hamentasch would be a latke. QED.

I stand by this argument, but more than that, the connection of Hanukkah and Purim is very real. Unlike the *chagim* (the pilgrimage festivals of Pesach, Shavuot, and Sukkot), or the *Yamim Noraim* (high holy days), Hanukkah and Purim are two holidays that arrive to Jews after the Torah and represent questions of Judaism in history.

But they approach the question of history in different ways. Purim suggests a model in which God is hidden; Hanukkah, in which God is present.

I think our experience of the world has room for both approaches. In the Purim model, we cannot see God at work in the world, and we learn that we must be responsible for ourselves. In the Hanukkah model, we see that God is there for us in the fire of our faith throughout the years, in the

flames of our menorah, and we can always reach out and find a sense of connection.

The dialectic between hiddenness and connection, between God's seeming-absence and palpable presence, appears in our lives all the time. We sometimes feel deeply close and connected; we sometimes feel distant or alienated. We sometimes live with an intense consciousness of purpose and drive; and we sometimes feel at loose ends, not sure how to proceed.

All of these are normal feelings, and the beauty of Judaism's dialectical holidays – holidays which make different claims on us and pull us in different directions – is that there is a role for all of these.

In these months between Hanukkah and Purim, let us remember that whether we feel connected or isolated, feel a sense of God's presence or absence, all of these feelings have a place in our tradition.
