Rabbi Ethan Tucker is President and Rosh Yeshiva at Hadar, a liberal, modern yeshiva in New York City, and chair in Jewish Law. Ethan also directs Hadar's Center for Jewish Law and Values. Ethan graduated from Ezra Academy in 1989. He was ordained by the Chief Rabbinate of Israel and earned a doctorate in Talmud and Rabbinics from the Jewish Theological Seminary and a B.A. from Harvard College. A Wexner Graduate Fellow, he was a co-founder of Kehilat Hadar, one of the first independent minyanim, and a winner of the first Grinspoon Foundation Social Entrepreneur Fellowship. He is the author, along with Rabbi Micha'el Rosenberg, of *Gender Equality and Prayer in Jewish Law* (2017).
